



Hammer at The Heart of Greenwell Point

The oldest is a coach-maker's, the smallest a jeweler's, the biggest is a shipwright's and the heaviest is a 28 pounder (12.7). They come from as far as England, and they are hanging from the ceiling by the hundred and his favourites aren't even being made any more. If you are a local you might know what, and who, I'm talking about. But if you don't, read on.

"HAMMALOT" is the museum of hammers, mallets and mauls quietly expanding in one of the streets of Greenwell Point, where local resident Brian Pickett's 4500 strong collection crowds every nook, cranny and rafter in a double garage. He has been fitting out with his collection for the past nine years.

When I asked, "Why hammers?", he immediately volleyed back, "Well, why not? When they lose their temper they don't fly off the handle. They just go soft."

But somehow I gathered that wasn't the real reason. As Brian himself admits, They're not a white glove collectible, so when the rest of the world is out collecting wine, stamps and antiques, why choose hammers?

"My first hammer was a 2oz.(57g) ball-pein I bought at a market. It was small, and I was fascinated because I realized it wasn't a child's toy, and I wondered what sort of person would use it. So curiosity got the better of me."

He wasn't kidding.

'I came home with 18 odd hammers that day and proudly announced to my wife that I was going to collect little

hammers.' In spite of this opening declaration, it took him little time to start collecting big ones too.

The collection has grown from 18 to 4500 in 14 years (that's almost 1 hammer per day!), and Brian has welcomed a range of community groups of all ages such as

all beckoning your attention. It won't take you long to get lost, as your eyes become intoxicated by the sheer number and variety of hammers to look at.

Though Brian tells me that "man's first hammer was his fist", the appeal of the collection is not harmed by skipping the



English coachman's hammer in the 18th century "strapped hammer" design, is estimated to be 250 years old.

For me, this was the best place to start. These aren't white glove collectibles," as Brian said, and he welcomes you to pick up his hammers and turn them over to get a feel for them and what they were used for. It is precisely this point that "HAMMALOT" gets in your blood because it is then you realize that every piece you take into hand has served in somebody else's, and that a unique and often forgotten history has borne itself out in the scars on the head and handle of every piece in the museum.

Probus, car clubs, senior citizens and cubs and scouts to explore row after row of hammers and mallets of all makes, materials and utilities.

The mini-museum has been fitted out with locally scavenged materials, such as post and rail fencing and single bed frames, to give the "hammer-shed" a rustic appeal, while being structurally sound enough to support hundreds of hammers hanging from the ceiling.

Managing to collect almost a hammer a day might seem a little far fetched too many people, and they'd be right if he had claimed to have done it alone.

"They are sent to me from all over Australia," he said. "I have received hammers from England, from Woomera in South Australia. Adelaide is a wonderful source of supply." This could only happen by virtue of a number of mutually beneficial arrangements Brian has with a small network of mates scattered around the country, many of whom are collectors themselves.

"I have specific people." It's a simple process: Brian finds, say, an old wood plane at a garage sale. Joe Bloggs, a vintage wood plane collector in Wauchope, may come across vintage hammer, and so the two organize to barter when their swags are full. But take care: you could be next!

"My wife says the roof's going to fall down," and you could be forgiven for fearing the same. To walk into the shed is to walk into an encroaching forest of handles and pendulous hammer-heads that double as wind chimes,



"Once people see my shed so many come back again and go crook on me, because they say how they always start

looking out for them, It affects people that way."

Until then have your eyes peeled for Brian Pickett trawling the markets and garage sales to ensure a hammer a day continues to make its way home to "HAMMALOT".

"I'm always looking for one older than the oldest. And while I'm willing and able the search goes on." Indeed it will, and I should know: I'm his son!



Foreshore Happenings

We're on a roll! As advised in the last Gazette, the rock revetment has been constructed on the Adelaide Street foreshore near Church Street and along the Haiser Road foreshore with the general consensus being that it's a great improvement. By the time you read this, the fishing platform to the North of Titania Park should be completed (or nearly so) and the dinghy storage at the end of Albert Avenue will have been reconfigured and enlarged. Work is scheduled to be in progress on the rock revetment adjacent to the swimming pool and Anzac Park and the landscape improvements in Anzac Park should be taking shape. These last two items have been delayed briefly as we were awaiting advice from heritage specialists.

Residents of Adelaide Street have received advice of the Development Application for the boat ramp and associated parking area. There should not be any problems associated with this application as the proposal is consistent with the Greenwell Point Master Plan that was subject to Public Consultation, amended in accordance with the comments made and subsequently approved and adopted. As advised in the last Gazette, this work is scheduled for construction in the 2008/2009 financial year.
